Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,



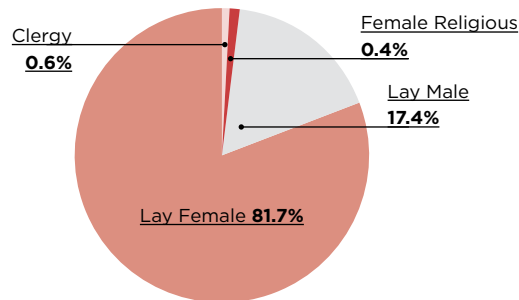
RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION

TUITION RATE AVERAGES

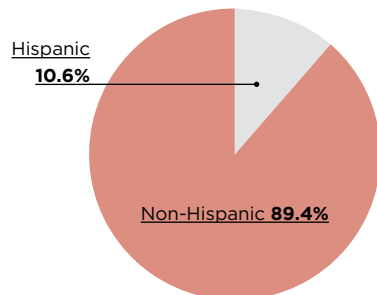

THE MONSIGNOR GERALD LAWRENCE LEWIS AWARD

was endowed in January 1992 as a means of honoring those individuals within the Catholic schools of the Diocese of Raleigh who have served with notable dedication and ability. The Excellence in Teaching Award honors superlative classroom teachers, grades K-12, who have illustrated strong commitment to their students, colleagues and schools and to their family, church and civic communities. The recipient of the Excellence in Teaching Award is an exceptionally skillful, dedicated full-time teacher. The Excellence in Teaching Award is presented on an annual basis and carries a monetary award to the recipient and to the recipient’s school.



ACADEMIC QUALITY

ACCREDITATION

Every five years, each Catholic school within the Diocese of Raleigh participates in a Performance Accreditation Process through AdvancED.

This Improvement Journey Process uses a set of rigorous research-based standards and evidence based criteria as they examine the whole school, their policies, programs, practices, learning conditions and cultural context to determine how well the parts work together to carry out the school's vision and meet the needs of every learner. In addition, our schools incorporate the National Catholic Standards and Benchmarks into their Improvement Journey process.

Our preschools and early childhood centers are in compliance using the Diocese of Raleigh Standards for Early Childhood.

One of the most important factors concerning student achievement is highly qualified teachers. Research shows that teacher subject-matter knowledge is greatly associated with student learning. Therefore, teachers within the Diocese of Raleigh are licensed through the North Carolina Department of Instruction (NCDPI) and are required to maintain current status.

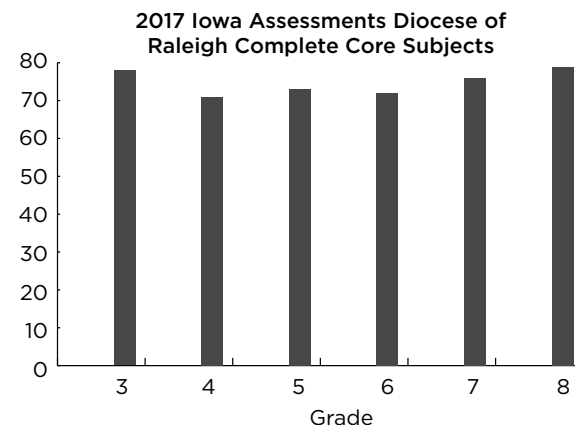
Our high school students have received 97% acceptance into colleges/universities. Some of these students will be attending East Carolina Honors College, Barton Honors College, NC State University, Clemson University, Belmont Abbey College and the University of South Carolina.

Five students were named National Merit Scholarship finalists.

\$19 million in college/university scholarships have been received by our students.

ACHIEVEMENT

Through the utilization of the Iowa Assessments and Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT's), our administration and educators review data and identify areas of excellence and those areas that may need further strategies to produce a more measurable outcome. The Diocese of Raleigh Catholic Schools remain consistent within the complete core subject areas. (reading, writing, math, science and social studies)

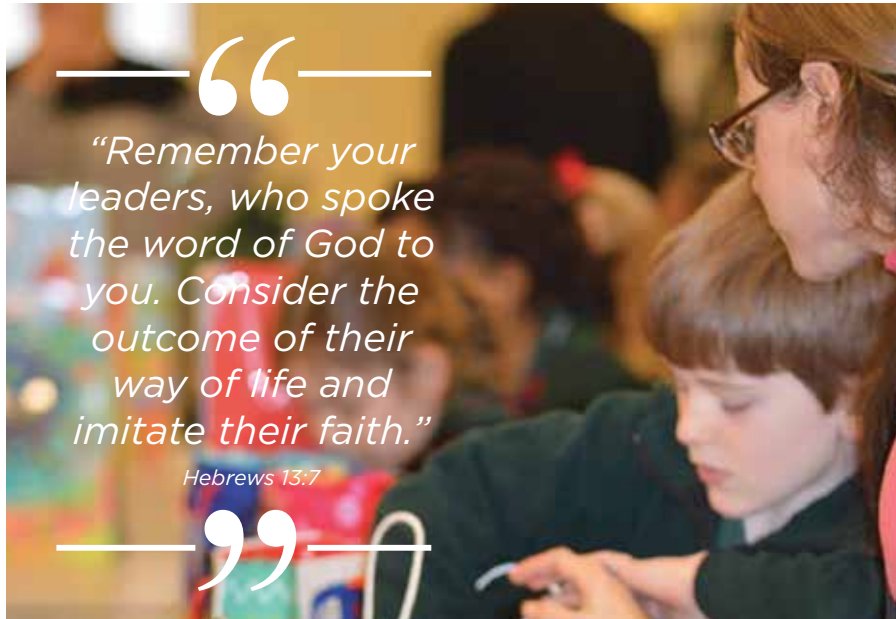

When a teacher, parent, student or community member is asked what they like about their local Diocese of Raleigh Catholic School, it is the sense of family, safety, service and community. Below are some highlights of this year:

St. Patrick School's community donated winter coats to children in Afghanistan and raised money for the Heifer Project to purchase farm animals for people in struggling, developing countries under the “teach a man to fish” philosophy.

Immaculata Catholic School partnered with the Diocese of Raleigh African Ancestry Ministry and Evangelization to raise more than \$1,000 for their scholarship fund and to provide school supplies to 25 children for the Grace of the Americas Program in Honduras.

Many of our schools, such as Our Lady of Perpetual Help and St. Catherine Catholic School, support our seminarians with cards and letters.

Appreciation for our veterans is demonstrated throughout the year at our schools. Some examples are the activities at: Our Lady of Perpetual Help; Annunciation Catholic School; Infant of Prague Catholic School's “Unique in God's Image Day”; Rosary for our Troops at St. Catherine; St. Mary Catholic School-Goldsboro and St. Ann Catholic School as they organize donation drives, letter/card writing, community/family speakers and individual school events, such as Veterans Day Breakfasts.

Cardinal Gibbons High School had 100 percent of their students participating in outreach efforts throughout the Triangle area and almost nearly 600 students attend or lead off-campus spiritual retreats.

Several St. Thomas More Catholic School students participated in the STM Church Environmental Committee's essay contest based upon the quote from Pope Francis in *Laudato Si*, “The entire universe speaks of God's love, His boundless affection for us. Soil, water, mountains: everything is ... a caress of God.” How can we as kids and grown-ups alike, respond to this tender love by caring for our home, the earth? Answering this question, five students placed and received awards.

Blessed Sacrament Catholic School's 7th- and 8th-grade students held a Living Wax Museum of Historical Catholic figures.

Even the youngest of our preschool students understand the meaning of service to our community as St. Michael Preschool conducts service projects to collect mittens, gloves, scarves, hats and blankets for those in need.

St. Francis of Assisi Preschool collaborated with The Franciscan School for their service project entitled, “Learn, Serve, Lead, and Succeed.”

EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP

LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

Today, as we look at the progression of our Catholic schools, there are many highlights. However, one of the challenges is obtaining effective Catholic leaders to serve as administrators. The Diocese of Raleigh Catholic Schools Office continues to find success in our Leadership Cohort Program. Teachers who have demonstrated leadership skills and aspiration are recommended to this two-year cohort. In the first year of the program, the four domains of Catholic Leadership are introduced. The second year consists of a local site assignment within our Diocesan schools where they receive real-world administrative experiences as an intern working alongside their mentor.

At the end of the two-year cohort, participants are surveyed and one response was, *“I have come away from my experience feeling that I am much closer to understanding the true weight of the job of principal. An entire community of people rely on the principal to make decisions with integrity and competence.”*



ADMINISTRATOR HIGHLIGHT

Mrs. Dana Corcoran, principal at Immaculata Catholic School, received the North Carolina Music Educators Association “Honor Administrator” award. Through her leadership, the arts have become an indispensable part of school life at Immaculata. She continues to support the program by implementing staffing, programming, and funding.

GOD'S WORK OUR CHALLENGE TUITION ASSISTANCE ENDOWMENT

In 2017-2018, the Diocese of Raleigh provided \$80,300, which was shared by 21 schools benefiting 161 children. In 2001, through the generosity of the faithful, the Diocesan Capital Campaign "God's Work, Our Challenge" created a tuition assistance endowment. This endowment was established to make Catholic school education more accessible to low income families.

THE OFFICE OF AFRICAN MINISTRY AND EVANGELIZATION TUITION ASSISTANCE

In 2017-2018, \$36,500 was distributed to assist 66 students in 19 Diocesan schools. The funds for the awards came from the Black and Indian Missions' grant awarded to the African Ancestry Ministry Office. Over the years, this office has provided funds to the Catholic schools of the Diocese. For the past decade, the focus has shifted towards family assistance instead of schools; and financially eligible families, regardless of school, are encouraged to apply.

NORTH CAROLINA OPPORTUNITY SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

More than 1.8 million dollars was distributed to assist 445 students for the 2017-2018 school year. The Opportunity Scholarship Program expands school choice in North Carolina through scholarship grants for children in kindergarten through 12th grade. This program provides funding up to \$4,200 per year for eligible children who choose to attend a participating non-public school.

BARBARA WOLFF ECONOMIDIS EARLY CHILDHOOD GRANT PROGRAM

Through the generosity of this gift, the Catholic Schools Office is able to offer grants in the areas of creativity and technology for our early childhood and kindergarten programs. To date, we have been able to award the following:



These funds will provide STREAM (Science, Technology, Religion, Art, Math) experiences, interactive technology, outside exploration opportunities, and behavior/support curriculum for our two to five-year-old students.



ACCOLADES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

PORTRAITS OF COMPASSION: THE MEMORY PROJECT USES ART TO HELP ERASE THE LINES BETWEEN CULTURES.

Faith, compassion and love are elements of a recipe for a Memory Project conducted at John Paul II High School in Greenville. Art teacher, Billy Stinson, received an invitation for his students to participate in this project that has art teachers and students create portraits of children in crisis around the world.

More than a dozen students at JP II participated in creating these personalized portraits that will be distributed to children in Syria. This project was more than drawing. It provided the art students with an increased understanding and empathy to the crisis in this country. Principal, Craig Conticchio, stated, *"Maybe it closes up the world a little bit more or opens it up a little bit for them."*



Our Stem School Highlights

- **Immaculata Catholic School** in Durham, has the first middle school program in North Carolina with the distinction of earning AdvancED STEM Certification. This certification recognizes that the school's STEM educational programs have met the rigor and substance vital to creating and sustaining superior, student-centered STEM teaching, and learning programs.
- Students at **St. Peter Catholic School** in Greenville, are building and programming autonomous robots as part of their work in art classes with teacher John Bell. St. Peter has leveraged the success of its first Lego League robotics teams to bring this STEM technology to many more students. Both Lego teams have qualified for the state championships two years in a row.
- **St. Mary Catholic School** in Wilmington, celebrated as their Science Olympiad Team placed first at the Science Olympiad Regionals held at University of North Carolina Wilmington this past March. This led the team to qualify for the State Science Olympiad at North Carolina State University where they placed 11th out of 225 teams!
- **St. Ann Catholic School's** chorus, under the direction of Sharona Carter, won the Fayetteville McDonald's Sing for Your School Big Mac Jingle Contest for their second year in a row.
- **St. Thomas More Catholic School** alumnus 2017, Ella Sullivan, was awarded one of Girl Scouting's highest honors, the Girl Scout Silver Award. This award challenges middle school-aged Girl Scouts to excel in leadership, community service, career planning, and personal development.
- **St. Mark Catholic School** in Wilmington, sent their Odyssey of the Mind Team to the World Finals at Iowa State University. This team was coached by Catherine Sawyer and was comprised of 3rd and 4th graders, who competed in the technical category as they put together a performance that told a story through the

use of emojis and texting. This international, creative, problem-solving competition had teams from across the United States and 25 different countries. This team won the Coastal Regional Competition and placed second in the North Carolina State Competition to earn a spot at World Finals. They placed 11th in the World!

- **Infant of Prague Catholic School** in Jacksonville, entered the city's contest for disability awareness as they submitted essays, poetry, and art. They had the highest number of winners out of the base, county, and private schools with five first place winners. Middle school language arts teacher, Carol Regeci, received an Excellence in Participation award.
- **Cardinal Gibbons High School** in Raleigh, had 23 student artists receive 45 honors for their work. These ranged from gold and silver to honorable mention in the 2018 Regional Scholastic Art Competition. Four of these students went on to earn national recognition placing their pieces in the top 1 percent of more than 350,000 works of art and writing submissions. Four student artists also received the Rhode Island School of Design Outstanding Artist Award.

- **St. Thomas More Catholic School**, Boy's Soccer Team wins Triangle Catholic Schools Athletic Conference (TCSAC) Championship.
- **Cardinal Gibbons High School** won five high school Athletic Association State Championships: Women's Cross Country, Women's Lacrosse, Cheerleading, Women's Golf, and Men's Soccer.
- **Cardinal Gibbons High School** coaches are honored: Nick Mangum was named the (Fall 2017) U.S. Track & Field and Cross-Country Coaches Association and N.C. Women's Cross-Country Coach of the Year, Patricia Alexander was honored by the National Federation of State High School Associations as Women's Lacrosse's 2017 Coach of the Year. Tim Healy was named Men's Soccer Coach of the Year by the N.C. Soccer Coaches Association.

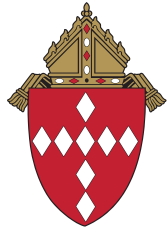
