

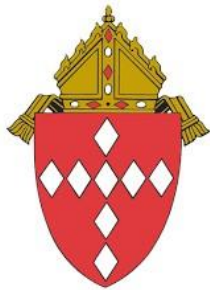

Section 2: Camporee Fees

(includes all activities, activity materials, lunch on Saturday and a Camporee patch)

By February 24, 2025:

\$18.00 per person – tent campers

\$12.00 per person – day campers

\$60.00 maximum for a family of 4 or more (tent or day campers).

After February 24, 2025:

\$20.00 per person – tent campers \$14.00

per person – day campers

\$65.00 maximum for a family of 4 or more (tent or day campers).

ACTIVITY AREA #2: Live! Animals, Environmental games, Stomp and Water Rockets, Slingshot, Catapult, Gaga Ball, Crafts, Field Sports **Meet at the shelter near the Activity Field**

Please take note of special times for Live! Animal presentations. To ensure the welfare of our visiting critters ... and to reduce stress upon them, we must be a little flexible with our schedules, especially Group C.

10:00-10:40am is Session 1 – during first Activity slot. **[Group B]**

11:00-11:40am is Session 2 – during second Activity slot **[Group A]**

12:00-12:40pm is Session 3 – this will happen at end of second Activity slot and into beginning of lunch **[Group C – note that this means you'll have to end your shooting a little early to make it to the animal presentation.]**

Section 6: Camporee Guidelines and Rules

- 1. Campsites.** Campsites will be assigned as registration is received. Most campsites will have more than one similar unit or family group assigned. Units must camp in the assigned areas. All campsites have a shelter with picnic tables, a fire ring and a small bath house. Water is potable at campsites. Facilities are to be shared equally by all assigned units in a campsite. One larger shower/toilet facility is located on each side of Camp Bowers and is to be shared by all campers assigned to nearby campsites.
- 2. Check-in.** Will begin at 4:00 pm on Friday March 7, 2025. No one can enter earlier. Upon arrival on Friday, units will check in at the Administration Building to pick up their packets and be directed to their campsites. Activity Group assignments will be listed in your packet. Camporee patches will be distributed to each unit after a successful campsite inspection on Sunday (except day campers, who will get them at check-in).
- 3. Vehicles.** Only three vehicles at a time per campsite will be given a CAMPSITE PASS and permitted to drive to campsite to unload. Please unload as quickly as possible and return your Campsite Pass to the parking attendants near the Administration Building so others in your campsite may enter. Unit trailers may be left in the campsite area. Please park all other vehicles in the designated lots near the Administration Building. For the safety of our campers, absolutely NO vehicles are allowed in the campsites overnight. Vehicles driving thru camp during the Camporee hours will be limited to camporee staff and handicap pass holders.
- 4. Camporee Headquarters.** Once check-in on Saturday morning is complete, Camporee Headquarters will be moved to the Dining Hall (south end) for the remainder of the Camporee. Camporee staff will be there 8:00 am – 9:00 pm on Saturday and 8:00-10:00am on Sunday to respond to questions or concerns.

5. Quiet Hours. Everyone must be in his or her respective campsite between the hours of 10:00 pm and 6:00 am. All are expected to be quiet. "A Scout is Courteous." This is each unit leader's responsibility.

6. Health and Safety. All safety precautions will be adhered to throughout the Camporee. Report all unsafe conditions and actions to the Camporee staff immediately. If the action is unsafe, stop the action.

The buddy system will be in effect throughout the Camporee.

7. Weather. If severe weather affects the Camporee, the Camporee staff, the Catholic Committee on Scouting representatives and/or the Camp Ranger will make the appropriate decision over-riding Unit leadership. No plans have been made for rescheduling the Camporee in the case of extreme weather or a major emergency. If the Camporee is to be cancelled, the Unit contact will be informed as soon as possible.

8. First Aid. Scout Leaders should "Be Prepared" to handle minor situations. Each unit is required to have a First Aid kit in their campsite. Serious injuries and emergencies must be reported immediately to the Camporee Headquarters (Dining Hall). There will be a trained Health and Safety Officer present on site during the entire Camporee. Units having additional trained medical personnel present are asked to notify our Health and Safety Officer upon arrival. The nearest full-service hospital is Bladen County Hospital in Elizabethtown, N.C. (16 miles away).

9. Campfires. Fire pits are available in each campsite. Under no circumstances should any trees be cut down. Use extreme caution with all fires. Keep all fires in the designated fire pit and at a reasonable size; never leave a fire unattended and always provide adult supervision for all fires. Each unit must bring its own fire extinguishers or have safety buckets (with water in them) available at a unit campfire. And please ensure a fire is completely out before leaving it unattended. NOTE: BSA prohibits liquid fire starters.

10. Cooking in Campsites. If there is a ban on open fires, all units need to plan for no-heat meals or use camp stoves properly. Use of liquid fuel, propane, and butane in stoves and lanterns is permitted only with knowledgeable adult supervision. This applies to all units and family campers.

11. Water. Water is available at the tap near each campsite latrine. Scouts and Scouters should plan to carry their own canteens or water bottles during all activities.

12. Uniforms/Shoes. Field (or "Class A") uniforms are to be worn during the Flag ceremony, Retreat Speaker and Mass on Saturday. Activity (or "Class B") uniforms may be worn at all other times. For safety, closed-toed shoes are required for all activities. *No flip-flops or sandals!* Sneakers or hiking shoes are best.

13. Service Project. Please encourage each scout and scouter in your unit to bring one or more of the following most-needed items to be donated to food pantry at the mission church of Our Lady of the Snows in Elizabethtown.

- Pasta
- Cereal
- Rice-a-Roni
- Mac & Cheese

Your donations can be dropped off at check-in or at Camporee Headquarters in the Dining Hall any time prior to Mass on Saturday.

14. Lost and Found. Lost and Found items should be turned into the Camporee Headquarters at the south end of the Dining Hall. These items will be displayed at the flag ceremony on Saturday evening and in Dining Hall on Sunday.

15. Campfire Program. Each unit is encouraged to participate in the campfire by performing a song, skit, cheer or other entertainment. Please submit your skit/song request to Camporee Headquarters by lunch time on Saturday. The Camporee staff must approve these performances in advance! Keep it fun (and remember, a Scout is Clean).

16. Liturgy. "A Scout is Reverent." A Catholic Mass will be held in the Dining Hall at 5:15 pm on Saturday. Celebrating the Mass will be Father Scott McCue. It is strongly recommended that all Scouts and Leaders participate. For the Mass and the Camporee as a whole, non-Catholics are ALWAYS welcome, and their participation enriches our gathering. **Volunteers are needed to assist with music at Mass.** Scouts or Scouters wishing to volunteer to play an instrument or sing, can contact Fr. Scott McCue, Diocesan Scout Chaplain, at smccue@stmccary.org.

17. Checkout & Campsite Inspection. Campsites will be inspected on Sunday morning between 8:00-9:30 am. As with Check-In, only 3 vehicles per campsite will be permitted to enter campsites. Car traffic will begin at 7:00 am. When your unit is packed and ready to Check-Out, please alert a Camporee staffer (in the Dining Hall HQ). Units will receive their Camporee patches following inspection. If there is more than one unit in your assigned campsite, those units are expected to clean the common areas together. Pavilions, bath houses, picnic tables and fire rings must be left as you found them or better. Leave No Trace principles apply! Fires must be completely extinguished.

18. Trash/Garbage. All trash belonging to your unit must be carried to the dumpsters on the road leaving camp (near the main road). Units should bring several large trash bags with them as supplies may be limited. Please ensure that all trash is in the dumpster, NOT piled on top.

19. **Prohibited Items.** Fireworks, firearms, sheath knives, illegal drugs, and alcoholic beverages. Anyone bringing prohibited items will be required to leave immediately with forfeiture of all fees paid.
20. **Absolutely No Pets Allowed.** Service animals and dogs used for the visually impaired are permitted.
21. **Rules Violations.** The Camporee Chief in consultation with the Camporee Staff will determine penalties for any violation of the rules.
22. **Cell Phone/Camp Phone.** Be advised that cell-phone reception at Camp Bowers can be spotty. Those with Verizon may have sufficient signal, other carriers may not. A land- line phone in the Administration Building is available for emergencies only.

- Turn into **Cape Fear Scout Reservation** (large wooden gateway at entrance)
- Follow signs along dirt access road to Camp Bowers:
 - bear left at Totem Pole, continue along dirt road, cross over red metal bridge,
 - admire Lake Katherine on your right, continue as road bends to right
 - pass by Camp McNeill ("Cub Scout World") on your left, enter Camp Bowers
- Administration Building will be on your right - pull into parking lot, park and come inside!
