ADVANCE MEDICAL DIRECTIVES



Requirements for Advance Directives

You are neither legally or morally required to have an Advance Directive document in the State of North Carolina.

Why should I create an Advance Medical Directive?

- Medical and Legal Authorities will be bound to respect your wishes.
- Your family will be apprised of your wishes before such time as you are unable to express those wishes.
- You can ensure the moral teachings of the Catholic Church are followed when health care decisions are made on your behalf.

Risks of Not having an Advance Medical Directive

- Your specific directions for your medical care may not be known or may be ignored.
- Decisions may be made by other family members than the person you would have chosen.
- Your family will face the burden of making decisions for you without your guidance and if they cannot agree, the burden of going through court proceedings.
- Moral aspects of these directives as taught by the Catholic Church may not be observed.

What is the process to Create an Advance Directive in North Carolina?

- 1. Put your health care wishes in writing
- 2. Sign the document
- 3. Have two witnesses sign and have their signatures notarized

Note: a legally binding form is included in this document.

Particular Instructions Regarding Life-Prolonging Treatment

You will have the opportunity to choose one of the choices below:

- Permit me to die naturally with only the medical procedures deemed necessary to ensure my comfort and alleviate pain (Note: continuing to provide nutrition and hydration is in accordance with Catholic Teaching unless it is of no benefit or burdensome).
- 2. Continue all treatments to prolong my life within the limits of generally accepted health care standards.
- 3. Allow my Health Care Agent to make end-of-life decisions based on my known values and wishes.

General Instructions: A Presumption for Life!

Among these:

- I believe I have come from God and will return to God in God's time, not mine.
- I reject treatment that uses any tissue or organ of an unborn or newborn child who is a product of induced abortion.
- I direct that medical treatment be provided without discrimination based on the perceived "quality" of my life.
- I direct that my life not be ended by euthanasia.
- I wish to follow the moral teachings of the Catholic Church. (If seriously ill or in a terminal condition, I request the sacraments of reconciliation, anointing of the sick and Viaticum.)

May Mary, the Mother of God, intercede for us now and at the hour of our death
