EVANGELIZATION AND MISSIONARY SPIRIT



Prioritizing evangelization by adapting to modern challenges, fostering a deeper understanding of faith-based love, and encouraging meaningful lives through listening and leadership.

VOCATIONS AND PRIESTHOOD



Promoting vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life through prayer, activities, and education to inspire individuals to respond to God's call.

"The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest."

Matthew 9:37–38

The journey of priestly formation begins at Baptism, when the new disciple of Jesus Christ begins to live the call to follow Christ in holiness. It is the same call disciples of Jesus have received since the foundation of the Church. St. John Paul II described seminary formation as "a continuation in the Church of the apostolic community gathered about Jesus, listening to his word, proceeding toward the Easter experience, awaiting the gift of the Spirit for the mission." This singular "journey of discipleship," begun in Baptism, "comes to be appreciated as the center of one's life at the beginning of Seminary formation, and continues through the whole of life."

MINISTRY PRIORITIES



HUMAN DIGNITY AND LIFE



Affirming the intrinsic value of every human from conception to natural death, transforming culture through ministries that prioritize love, community, and holistic well-being.

"See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God."

1 John 3:1

Every human person possesses an infinite dignity, inalienably grounded in his or her very being, which prevails in and beyond every circumstance, state, or situation the person may ever encounter. This principle, which is fully recognizable even by reason alone, underlies the primacy of the human person and the protection of human rights. In the light of Revelation, the Church resolutely reiterates and confirms the ontological dignity of the human person, created in the image and likeness of God and redeemed in Jesus Christ. From this truth, the Church draws the reasons for her commitment to the weak and those less endowed with power, always insisting on "the primacy of the human person and the defense of his or her dignity beyond every circumstance."

The parish is a place where such experienced couples can help younger couples, with the eventual cooperation associations, ecclesial movements and new communities."
