The Power of Life and Death is In the Tongue Part 2: The Power of Silence By Debbie Rony

The last article I wrote fo-

cused on choosing our words carefully as well as making proclamations with Gods Word and our faith into specific situations we encounter. However, there are times in our lives and our circumstances when we are just called to be SILENT. As

Christians, we are often called to show restraint

especially when persecuted or undergoing a trial by fire. Unfortunately, these may be the **very times** when we seem to have the least self- control in regards to our mouth! Living the

Gospel of Jesus sometimes just means zipping our lips and acting like the Christian we profess to be. St. Francis of Assisi famously said, "Preach the Gospel at all times and when necessary use words."

There are many times in our lives when the Lord will call us to remain silent and talk only to HIM. For many of us this may be a very hard thing to do. The bible teaches us about the power of remaining silent and trusting in God even in the most adverse situations through the examples of Jesus and Our Lady. Let's face it. When we are undergoing hardship we may complain and otherwise lament about our circumstances with a friend, relative, or coworker (keep in mind we are usually not content telling just one person!). Repeating the same negative words only serve to *reinforce* the hard feelings we may already have. In other words, we stir our own pot and keep stirring it! I believe one of the best examples of someone remaining silent when facing an uncertain and worrisome future in the bible is

the Blessed Virgin Mary. When it was announced to her by the angel Gabriel that she would conceive the Messiah through the power of the Holy Spirit, all she said, in essence was "How can this be?" She didn't ask the angel a hundred questions about "How am I going to do this?". She simply trusted God and said,

"...let it be done to me according to your word." She was a woman of few words and the bible said she often "pondered all things in her heart." To ponder is to "weigh mentally' and to "carefully consider". In other words, she most likely led a life of interior contemplation and not outward communication to

others In the midst of what must have seemed like an uncertain future. When we undergo trials in our own lives how often do we just "ponder" all things in our own hearts rather than running off to tell other people? Don't get me wrong though.: It is good to seek wise counsel but we must always **start** with God. After that we **silence** ourselves to listen to the One who is Our Counselor. I once heard a priest say, "Never talk to your friends more than you talk to God!" This is especially true when someone offends us or hurts us. Our natural instinct may be to lash out and retaliate with harsh words, judgement and criticism. The bible says, "do not return evil for evil". We run the risk of sinning against God and neighbor when we use our tongue to "curse" someone. According to the amplified bible the greek word for curse means "to speak evil of someone". That means speaking of them in an unkind and uncharitable way.

The power of our unkind and evil words carry weight in the spiritual realm. This is why the bible says to bless and NOT to curse. There is a great temptation today to "speak our mind" or lash out at people who wound us but this is the exact opposite of the example our Lord Jesus gave us. To be clear, I am not speaking of people who are physically, mentally, or sexually abused because they can and should speak out about the

injustice done to them. Rather, I am speaking of the everyday

offenses and hurts that we receive from those close to us, in our community, and even when we are persecuted for our faith. We will suffer like Jesus suffered but we are not to retaliate.

We are not just called to be the hands and heart of Jesus: we are called to have His Mind and His Mouth. I saw a Facebook post recently that illustrates the importance of remaining silent and talking only to God about some things. It is simple but not easy and we must ask ourselves, "What would Jesus do?"

"For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example that you should follow in His footsteps. ""He committed no sin. And no deceit was found in his mouth."" When he was insulted, he returned no insult; when he suffered, he did not threaten; instead, he handed himself over to the one who judges justly." 1 Peter 2:21-23
